Over the past 25 years archaeology, documentary evidence, connoisseurship and modern scientific analysis have reshaped the understanding and attributions of early English porcelains. This seminar will cover the development of English porcelains, the manufactories that produced them and the re-attributions that have taken place, their decoration, their position in the context of European porcelain and the work of independent English decorators.

The San Francisco Ceramic Circle 40th anniversary seminar is dedicated to the memory of Dorothy and Thelma Carson as a token of gratitude for their generous bequest to the San Francisco Ceramic Circle. Dorothy and Thelma lived at Walnut Creek in the East Bay and were among the early members of the Ceramic Circle with particular interest in English porcelain and remained active members through the 1980s. Thelma, the last of the Carson sisters, passed away in 2008 at the age of 98 and remembered the San Francisco Ceramic Circle with a substantial bequest from the Carson Sisters Trust.

General information about May in San Francisco

May is the last month of spring in San Francisco and is one of the most inviting months to visit. Characteristically cloudless and mild, some of the warmest and driest days of the year occur during San Francisco's spring months. Rainfall is typically around 1/2 inch for all of May and it is before the summer fogs make their presence felt. In early May sunrise will be at around 6.10 AM and sunset 8.00 PM leaving ample time to see Victorian San Francisco and the natural beauty of the area.

Should you plan to spend additional time in San Francisco there are many fine and decorative arts attractions in the City and Bay Area. Among these are the following:

Further afield are Muir Woods and the wine country of Napa and Sonoma to the north and to the south the mission town of San Juan Bautista and the coast to the Monterey peninsula and Carmel. To the east is Sacramento, which is home to the Crocker Art Museum with the Gilmeister collection of Meissen porcelain, the Swindler collection of stonewares and the Minton tile floors of the Crocker mansion. Sacramento also has the California State Railroad Museum. Even further afield still are the rest of California's attractions and museums.

About the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco and their Ceramic Collections

The Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco are comprised of the de Young Museum in Golden Gate Park and the Museum of the Legion of Honor in Lincoln Park. The de Young has collections of American art, international contemporary art, textiles and art from the Americas, the Pacific, and Africa. The Legion of Honor displays collections of 4,000 years of ancient and European fine and decorative art. Both museums have interesting collections of ceramics.

At the Legion of Honor, the Porcelain Gallery underwent extensive renovation in 2009. 200 objects in the gallery are now devoted to telling the story of English porcelains made at Bow, Chelsea, Worcester, Lowestoft and Longton Hall through the end of the 18th century. Other highlights in the gallery include the Bowles collection of Chantilly, as well as porcelains by Meissen, Nymphenburg, Hochst, Sèvres and others, Italian maiolica and Dutch tin glazed earthenwares. Also at the museum is a collection of Greek Attic pottery.

At the deYoung there is a large collection of Meso-American pottery, and also collections of 19th and 20th century U.S. ceramics and examples of contemporary ceramic art.

The Cult of Beauty: The Victorian Avant-Garde, 1860–1900

The Cult of Beauty: The Victorian Avant-Garde, 1860–1900 is the first major exhibition to explore the unconventional creativity of the British Aesthetic Movement. It traces the evolution of this movement from a small circle of progressive artists and poets, through the achievements of innovative painters and architects, to its broad impact on fashion and the middle-class home. This tour de force exhibit showcases the entirety of the Aesthetic Movement's output, celebrating the startling beauty and variety of creations by masters as diverse as artists Dante Gabriel Rossetti, James McNeill Whistler, and Edward Burne-Jones and designers E.W. Godwin, William Morris and Christopher Dresser.

Pre Seminar Tour

Limited to 40 SFCC and ACC member seminar attendees ONLY
with spaces allocated on a first come first served basis.

The tour will be conducted as two groups of 20 each. Each group will visit 3 private collections and include a visit to Filoli for lunch and to see the house, collections and gardens.

The private collections that will be visited are 1) an important collection of early Meissen porcelain spanning the period from the start of the factory to the mid 18th century with many pieces from the collection of Augustus the Strong including Chinese and Japanese examples; 2) a collection of blue transfer printed Middle Eastern, Indian and Chinese scenes on Staffordshire pottery together with the 18th and early 19th century source prints produced by English travelers and artists and a collection of 19th century English chinoiserie porcelains, and 3) a collection of 18th century English and Continental porcelain figures and wares including examples from Italy, the Netherlands, Denmark and many of the smaller German factories, together with English pottery of the 19th century and Jugendstil porcelain figures.

Both groups will meet at Filoli for Lunch. Filoli, located 30 miles south of San Francisco, is an historic site of the National Trust for Historic Preservation and one of the finest remaining country estates of the early 20th century. The gardens are spectacular and should be at their peak in May. The house was built after the San Francisco earthquake by Mr and Mrs Bourn in Georgian style. The house is furnished with English furniture and has a range of ceramics including English and Continental tin glazed earthenwares, English porcelain and pottery and a small but very fine collection of early French porcelains.

The tour buses will depart Union Square at 8:15 AM and stop to pick up others parking at Fort Mason at 8:30 AM then proceed to tour destinations. Lunch will be at 12:15 PM and the tour will return to San Francisco by 5:00 PM.

To reserve your space/s on the tour include the tour fee/s with your registration. Please indicate whether you want to be wait listed for the tour in the event it is oversubscribed. If the tour is oversubscribed before your registration is received your tour fees will be returned in full unless you request wait listing. In this case your fee will be retained until May 4 and then returned in full if we are unable to accommodate you.

Note: Those who are not members of the SFCC or ACC may wish to consider becoming members of the SFCC to be eligible for the tour. Membership is \$60 individual and \$95 dual and benefits will include discounted seminar attendance, eligibility for the tour and all other SFCC privileges.
